

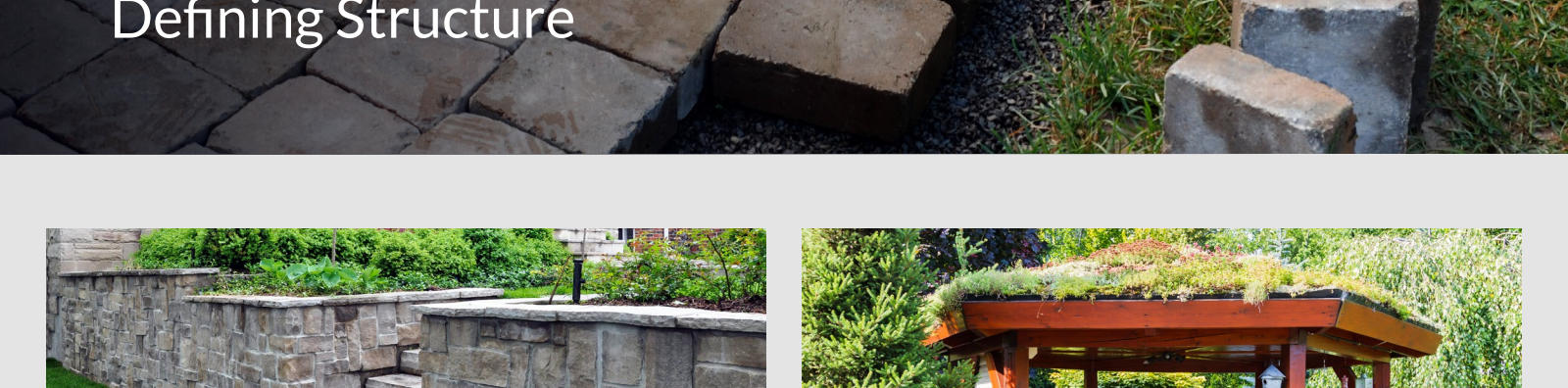


The Artistry Of Hardscaping & Softscaping



- Soften hardscape with trees, shrubs, and flower beds.


